Many of the residents at Morning Star arrive with educational deficits and are behind in their schooling. For the older ones, getting them to graduate high school provides them with much better options moving forward. When they turn 18 they legally “age out” of the government’s system and are no longer required to remain at Morning Star. However, finding a functional path forward for them is both a spiritual and moral obligation we take seriously. In the case of both Juana and Ana, they turned 18 recently but will not finish high school until December of this year. Transfer to another school to finish out the year is not possible, so we seek the Lord’s direction



for a solution. In their case, one of our caregivers and her husband who live across the street from Morning Star opened their home to the girls for the remainder of the year allowing them to come on campus to study in the mornings. Two afternoons a week they each work part time at Morning Star beginning to undertake their own financial responsibilities and learning to manage their budget, etc. So far, our “transitional system” seems to be working for them and we’d appreciate your prayers regarding their future once they graduate.



With the adoption of the twins last month as well as the departure of the two girls, we now have a few coveted spots available. One of the issues that has been on our heart has been the reunification of siblings, who due to space limitations had to be split up when they were removed from their home of origin. Just one example is Claudia whose two brothers were placed in two other separate facilities. We have filed the request to have the two boys transferred to Morning Star and would love for you to be praying for the process to make its way through the system.



We are grateful we can continue to serve these delightful children and direct their attention towards a heavenly Father who loves and cares for them.
